Admission Criteria For Entry into Year 8

During the admissions procedure, when applying the criteria, punctual applications will be considered before late applications are considered. The application procedure opens on 27 January 2026 at 12 noon [GMT] and an application submitted by the closing date of 19 February 2026 at 12 noon [GMT] will be treated as a punctual application. An application received after 12 noon [GMT] on 19 February 2026 and up to 4pm on 24 February 2026 will be treated as a late application.

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Respective functions of the Board of Governors and Principal in relation to Admissions to the school.

Pupils resident in N Ireland at the time of their application will be considered before any pupil not so resident.

The religious and educational philosophy of the school is that of a Catholic school and, reflecting this, the school welcomes applications from all denominations and none. The Board of Governors has drawn up the criteria for admission to the school and delegated their application to the Principal, assisted by the Board of Governors. These criteria will be applied in the order set out below.

Applicants:

- Children who, at the date of application, reside in or attend primary school in the parishes (in order) of: St Mary's on the Hill, St Gerard's, Loughshore parishes (St Mary's Greencastle, Star of the Sea, Whitehouse- St James', Whiteabbey), Carrickfergus, Crumlin, Holy Family, St Patrick's, Sacred Heart, St Vincent de Paul, Holy Cross.
- Children who, at the date of their application, have a child of the family currently enrolled at the school.
- Children who, at the date of their application, are the eldest or only child of the family to be eligible to apply for admission to the school.
- Children who are entitled to Free School Meals (FSME).

If over-subscribed in any one of the sub-criteria, taken in order, then children will be selected based on the initial letter of the surname as identified on the birth certificate presented at time of application. The order is set out below and was predetermined by a randomised selection of the alphabet.

In the event of surnames beginning with the same letter, the subsequent letters of the surname will be used in alphabetical order using the above randomised selection. In the event of two or more identical surnames the alphabetical randomised order of the initial of the forename, as identified on the birth certificate presented at time of application, will be used.

In the event of the forename beginning with the same letter, the subsequent letters of the forename will be used in alphabetical order using the above randomised selection.

Admission Criteria

Duty to Verify:

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any applicant's Application Form.

Please include birth certificate and proof of eldest child/FSME where applicable.

Any two of the following documents can be used to verify address at which the child is resident:

- Bank or building society statement;
- Utility bill (for instance Electricity, Gas, Television Licence, Telephone, Mobile phone bills not accepted);
- Addressed payslip;
- Letter awarding Child Benefit to the child or another letter relating to this benefit;

- Mortgage statement;
- · Land and Property Services rates demand.
- Financial statement such as ISA,
 Pension or Endowment.
- Current Driving Licence;
- Rental agreement

If the requested evidence is not provided to the Board of Governors by the deadline specified by the Board of Governors, this will result in the withdrawal of an offer of a place. Similarly, if information is supplied which appears to be false or misleading in any material way, the offer of a place will be withdrawn.







Admissions to Year 8 after 1st September 2026

Parents who wish to have their child considered for admission in the event of a place arising after 1 September 2026 should write to the Principal clearly stating this. In the event of a vacancy arising the above criteria will be applied to these applications only.



The PE department seeks to deliver our objective by providing a range of sporting and active opportunities that pupils can enjoy. We seek to encourage participation, identify talent, and develop performance.

The PE department also offers pathways in academic courses to encourage career paths in the sports industry. This is provided through the BTEC syllabus. At Key Stage 4, the pupils follow BTEC sports Level 2 and at Post 16 we offer the Level 3 course.

This has provided the route for many of our pupils to continue their enjoyment of sport and have a career doing what they love.

The PE Department is at the centre of our range of extra-curricular activities. The sports activity programme gives the pupils an opportunity to develop personal and social skills as well as pursue sporting interests. There is a very strong tradition of sport and there is a sense of pride in the pupil when representing the school.



This past year our pupils have achieved remarkable sporting success. Our Elite Rhythm Crew Dance Team won major honours at the NICMAC Dance Competition, while our handball players represented the College at the World Handball Championships in New York. Gaelic Games continue to thrive, with several pupils lifting the U16 Antrim Championship with Naomh Éanna. Aoibhea Stanton and Mia Carlin have been selected for the Antrim U16 LGFA team and Maeve McMenamin and Mae McKinlay earned places on the Antrim U14 LGFA team. Both our Year 10 Boys and Girls Gaelic teams claimed Antrim Shields and Nathan Burns, Jayden James and Aaron Hartley are representing ERC on the Antrim schools team in the Ulster Colleges Rannafast Cup.

Beyond Gaelic Games, Fiadh Rodgers competed for Ireland at the European Trampolining Championships in Lisbon, producing outstanding scores. Cross country also continues to grow, with pupils finishing in the top 15 at the Belfast Championships and Eloise McAuley reaching the regional final. These achievements reflect the vibrant sporting culture at Edmund Rice College, where pupils are encouraged to strive for excellence and develop lifelong skills through sport.
